

Midlands music industry on the up...

A new report has revealed that the total spend generated by music tourism in the West Midlands last year was £271million - a £7million increase on 2014. The 2016 edition of the Wish You Were Here report, created on behalf of UK Music and its members, also revealed that there was significant growth in the amount spent directly by music tourists in the region, with an 82% increase year on year - the equivalent of £50million. The spend can be attributed to a range of purchases, including tickets, merchandise, accommodation, food and drink. Commenting on the report, Emma Gray, Director of Marketing and Communications at Visit Birmingham, said: "The city's diverse array of festivals combined with world class venues have created the perfect breeding ground to nurture and promote musical ingenuity. This report confirms just how much music tourism can boost local employment and stimulate the wider economy."



Travelling Natural History Museum makes its way to Shropshire


A 'roarsome' one-day event is set to leave a monster-sized footprint on Telford Town Park's QEII Arena this month. Taking place on Saturday 16 July, the free-to-attend Carnival Of Giants sees the Travelling Natural History Museum bringing a huge selection of prehistoric creatures to Shropshire.

Attractions on the day include a sand dig that contains a T-Rex skeleton, providing children with the chance to uncover fossilised dinosaur bones.

The event also features a 500-person parade, numerous sports activities, a dressing-up box, a craft marquee, a climbing wall, a market and a mini fair.

Commenting on the event, Councillor Liz Clare, cabinet member for Culture, Sport, Parks & Green Spaces, said:

"Children and adults alike are going to be blown away by the sheer size and scale of the prehistoric creatures on display - and while the emphasis will be on having fun, I have no doubt that everyone who attends will leave the event knowing a little bit more about dinosaurs then they did before."




Two Midlands dates for award-winning artist

An award-winning disabled artist will this month paint a portrait of pioneering filmmaker John Akomfrah at Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery (Saturday 16 July), as part of a project celebrating the diversity of common humanity.

Tanya Raabe-Webber's live sitting, fusing digital and traditional drawing and painting techniques, will see the artist in conversation with Akomfrah, exploring his life and work and contemplating the relevance of the artistic process to cultural diversity and contemporary society.

Commenting on the live portrait sitting, Tanya said: "As a disabled artist, the notion of my own diversity drives my interest in people, the exploration of the human condition and the belief that everyone has the potential to be creative if given the opportunity. I am well known as a painter of people; however, I've wanted to develop a way to engage audiences more fully in the subject matter of my work and also within its physicality. I've developed this project to enable creativity to be as accessible as possible." The project, titled Portraits Untold, continues at Stoke City Football Club later in the year where Tanya will paint the club's 'biggest fan', Neil Baldwin (pictured) on 19 September.

THE MANY FACES OF Rebecca Vaughan

Dyad Theatre brings three solo shows to Stafford Gatehouse







From Tudor queen to shell-shocked soldier, Regency heroine to Hollywood icon, Dyad Theatre's Rebecca Vaughan portrays a dazzlingly diverse array of characters in her touring solo shows.

A small team comprising just six people and usually only one performer, Dyad focuses on 'radical' approaches to familiar stories - radical, according to Vaughan, in its original sense of returning to roots. By using only words directly lifted from either fictional texts or the writings of real, historical figures, the company aims to paint honest, intimate pictures of the real and invented characters it takes as its subjects.

"We try not to invent or deny anything, but within that you've got worlds that you can play with," Vaughan explains. "With iconic figures like Elizabeth I or Marilyn Monroe, everyone has ideas about who they were, but we often gloss over the more interesting, troubled, vulnerable parts of their characters. Going back to those and trying to show an honest whole is really interesting - as audiences, we get so used to clichés that it's quite refreshing to challenge them."

This year, Dyad tours three shows to Stafford Gatehouse, two drawn from the same well of inspiration, the other a reimagining of a more familiar novel.

Weaving together several different stories, Female Gothic is the product of Vaughan's raiding of the treasure trove of underrated, under-read and often forgotten gothic tales penned by Victorian women writers.

"I'd been reading an MR James collection and in the introduction to this edition, it said that 85 to 90% of all Victorian and Edwardian ghost stories and tales of the macabre were written by women, so I decided to do some research. It's fascinating: loads of the writers we now know for other things, like Gaskell and Edith Wharton, were all part of this. Even E Nesbit, who we think of as a children's writer, was far better known for these kinds of tales in her own time. Then there are others like ME Braddon, who was almost as famous as Dickens at one point







but has been mostly forgotten since. She wrote about 50 novels and absolutely hundreds of short stories, almost all of which are out of print now."

Marking something of a departure from Dyad's usual style of theatre, the production uses the device of a central narrator figure with her own dark story as a framework around which various tales can coalesce. Through this character, Vaughan is also able to interpret and comment on the stories.

"I wanted to somehow join them all together in a bigger world rather than just having separate tales. Of those I found, some are written in first person and some in third person, and lots of them have a kind of narrator figure, so to create this character, I've compiled material from some of the stories that I haven't included in the show in full."

In turn, Female Gothic led to the development of a second show, Christmas Gothic, in which the same central character returns with a whole new set of spooky stories.

"One of the things I discovered was that, whereas we tend to see these tales as being a very autumnal, Halloweeny thing, the Victorians viewed them as something very festive. If you think of A Christmas Carol, for instance, it's one of our most famous Christmas stories, but it's also a ghost story. Christmas shows are so popular - people love going to the panto - that I decided there must be a market for this, and that was backed up by the fact that in the original tour, nearly all the shows sold out!"

Meanwhile, the third show heading for Stafford this year is one that places even greater demands on Vaughan as a solo performer. A unique adaptation of Virginia Woolf's classic 1925 novel, Dalloway, sees Vaughan play multiple characters in the same story, all without the help of costume changes or any supporting cast members.

"Dalloway is one of my favourite things I've been in," she gushes. "I love the novel - it's so beautiful, and deals with a lot of issues that are really relevant to us now, like mental health and the ways in which we hide our real selves from the world. The story takes place on one day and centres on this middleaged socialite, Clarissa Dalloway, and Septimus Smith, a soldier returning from the First World War. The two never meet, but through various events, we see how they each affect each other. We were really interested in this idea that we're all connected on some level, and we thought that having one person play all of the characters would be an interesting way of representing that."

If you're thinking that this all sounds insanely ambitious, you're not alone. Even Vaughan herself was far from free of reservations about performing alone when the idea was first suggested to her.

"I actually started doing this quite recently within the scheme of my career. I'd been doing fairly well as a 'normal' actor, but the larger the theatres and the egos of some of the performers I was working with became, the more I felt that I was losing sight of why I became an actor in the first place. I'd always loved the tradition of people coming into a dark room and just listening to a story, and I remember standing in a 1,500-seat theatre with an audience who were miles away and realising that I was looking for something else.

"The following year, I met a producer called Guy Masterton who offered to teach me how to produce. He suggested that I do a solo show, and at the time it just sounded like the most terrifying thing I could imagine. But the more we talked about it, the more I got used to the idea, and I started putting together a piece called Austen's Women. When I eventually came to perform it, once I'd got over that initial rabbit-in-the-headlights feeling, I immediately fell in love with it. It just felt like the most intimate, honest theatrical experience I'd been part of for years."

For Vaughan, the most exciting thing about performing alone in smaller venues is the di-

rect connection she can foster with an audience - sometimes to a greater extent than viewers are aware!

"I love the fact that the audience are completely on the journey with you, and I think they enjoy it too, being able to see the whites of an actor's eyes. I remember once after a show I was standing next to someone in the loos, and she couldn't believe that I recognised her from the audience."

Of course, it's not just important for viewers to connect with a performer. For a piece of theatre to really be effective, an actor must transcend this, persuading the audience of the realness of the characters and allowing them to temporarily suspend their disbelief. Naturally, this presents a major challenge for a solo performer, but it's one that Vaughan seems to relish.

"There are times when it feels like it's going to be really hard, particularly when I'm playing male characters, but you just have to breathe and let them come through like oil on top of water. One of the things I've learned from Dalloway is the importance not just of what a character says but of how they say it. The words someone uses and even the cadence of their sentences informs exactly who they are, and the physicality kind of follows on from that. During rehearsals, each one becomes very distinct, taking on their own vocal palette and physical expression. Of course, I never see them, but I've been told by other people that they forget they're watching me - that they don't even see me or what I'm wearing after a while. So I think if you ignite an audience's imagination in the right way, they will do a lot of the work for you."

Dyad Theatre perform Dalloway at Stafford Gatehouse on 27 September; Female Gothic on 31 October, and Christmas Gothic on 20 December.

REVIEW: Avatar, Shrewsbury

Indian cuisine, a cut above the rest...



Mardol Head, one of Shrewsbury's most historic areas, was once the place to visit for a rowdy night out. Nowadays it's home to an abundance of popular Indian, Thai and Italian eateries. It's also the place where Indian & Nepalese fine dining restaurant Avatar opened its doors to the 'town of flowers' back in 2014.

Owner Sustant Khatri has worked across both India and Nepal with the luxury hotel groups Taj and Oberoi, as well as in some of London's most prestigious Indian restaurants (including Cinnamon Club in Westminster). He chose to expand his Avatar brand to

Shrewsbury following the success of his Leicestershire-based restaurant.

Avatar boasts refined yet creative Nepalese and Indian cuisine, with the menu incorporating both traditional classic favourites and original new dishes that apply eastern flavours with a western twist.

On arrival, we were met by broad, welcoming smiles from all the staff. The friendly greeting, allied to the crisp, fresh décor, helped create a perfect atmosphere.

We perused the extensive menu over a cold Cobra and some poppadoms - a necessity when visiting an Indian restaurant. The menu is split up into sections - traditional starters and house special starters, fresh seafood dishes, traditional dishes, innovative dishes and a vegetarian section. There's also a list of homemade breads and sides. The menu even states, 'If you like any dish which is not on the menu, our chef is very happy to make it for you'.

Straight away the professionalism and knowledge of the staff, both inside and outside the kitchen, shone through.

Every starter from the traditional and house special list sounded delicious. Amongst the options featured were: momo (£3.95) chicken, onion, coriander and garam masala steamed dumplings served with a house special tomato and sesame seed chutney; guinea fowl tikka (£5.95); monk fish tikka (£6.95); piro king prawns (£5.95). Being huge seafood lovers, my partner and I opted for the seafood platter (£12.95). It consisted of black tiger prawns, chilli-fried squid, crab cakes and salmon tikka. All elements were seasoned carefully, presented beautifully and cooked to perfection - a very enjoyable start to the evening. Although tempted by the fresh

Although tempted by the fresh seafood section's lobster balchao (£24.95) - lobster spiced with garlic sweet chilli butter and matured with dill and grand marnier liquor - for my main I opted for the venison coconut chilli fry (£12.95) from the innovative dishes list. This consisted of strips of venison fillet tossed with onion, tomato, ginger and spices with coconut. Just like the

starter, it was a perfectly produced plate of food. The venison was tender and melted in the mouth, with the other elements creating a perfect all-round flavour.

My partner chose the Nepalesestyle duck (£11.95), again from the innovative dishes section glazed Gressingham duck breast cooked with cinnamon, bay leaf, ginger, cardamom and orange juice. That, too, was stunning. The chefs here really know how to cook! We shared a garlic fried rice, a cheese-and-onion naan and a side of tarka dal, all of which were of a high standard. The tarka dal was one of the nicest I've ever tasted.

Tinariwen

Theatre Severn, Shrewsbury, Tues 19 July Playing 'Assouf', or guitar poetry, Tinariwen is a group of Tuareg-Berber musicians from the Sahara Desert. Formed in Libyan refugee camps in the late 1970s, the band gained an international profile with the 2001 release of The Radio Tisdas Sessions. One of the most exciting and successful bands to come out of West Africa, they set their message of freedom over struggle, exile and rebellion to the sound of rolling, yearning grooves.

The Overtones

The Buttermarket, Shrewsbury, Sat 16 July



The five fellas who make up highly regarded vocal harmony group The Overtones were working together as painters and decorators when they were discovered by a Warner Brothers scout, who heard them singing during their tea break. A multi-album deal was subsequently secured with the record label. Blending '50s harmonies with modern pop, their debut offering featured a number of original tracks which the boys themselves had written (including first single Gambling Man and title track Good Ol' Fashioned Love). Numerous TV appearances have followed in the ensuing years, with slots on shows such as Dancing On Ice and Britain's Got More Talent ensuring they've remained very much in the public eye.

People are decidedly split on Verdi's Falstaff. For some, it's a warm and wise comedy; for others, a work that struggles to make the grade, due mainly to the relative weakness of its source material - Shakespeare's not altogether universally acclaimed Merry Wives Of Windsor.

Verdi's final opera, it was composed as a response to the oft-voiced accusation that he was no good at writing comedy - hence his decision to place Shakespeare's funniest character at the very heartland of the work. The City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra are joined for this new production by the CBSO Chorus and a cast headed by baritone Ambrogio Maestri, who plays Falstaff. Edward Gardner conducts. The opera is sung in Italian with English surtitles.

BBC National Orchestra Of Wales

Lichfield Cathedral, Sat 9 July

Lichfield Festival's closing cathedral concert is a reflective contemplation on the First World War. Vaughan Williams' The Lark Ascending and Symphony No 5 both feature, framing a concert that also includes Colin Matthews' No Man's Land. Premiered to great critical acclaim in 2011, the piece evokes many facets of war, from grim black humour to patriotic songs on a honky-tonk piano...

Moreton Hall, Weston Rhyn, Sun 17 - Sun 31 July

This international festival and summer school is now in its fourth year - and although it's called Piano Week, the event actually takes place over a period of two weeks and one day.

LEVELLING THE LAND

The Levellers' Mark Chadwick talks festivals, folk music, and filming a documentary

We're living in a very scary world with a lot of injustices right now, and I don't really understand why people aren't singing about it.

In the late 1980s, a bunch of young radicals on the fringes of the so-called 'crusty' traveller movement emerged onto the booming indie music scene with a band that took its name from a 17th century progressive political faction. Inspired both by popular punk bands like The Clash and by the folk acts they'd been hearing on the live circuit, The Levellers developed a fresh, dynamic sound, combining traditional acoustic instruments with electric base, thumping rhythms and a furious rock energy, as well as unapologetically politicised lyrics.

In some ways, it's hard to imagine less likely candidates for mainstream musical success, but something about the frustrated, rebellious spirit of the time combined with their exhilarating live performances enabled them to build a massive audience. Their first album, A Weapon Called The Word (1990), went gold and their second, Levelling The Land (1991), entered the charts at number 14 and eventually went platinum. Twenty-seven years, multiple albums and a documentary film later, The Levellers are still going strong. Though it's been a few years since their last studio album, the band have been continually out on tour, releasing several live records as well as their Greatest Hits.

What's On caught up with Levellers frontman Mark Chadwick.

"We've been writing and working on new songs since November, and we've been trying some of them out live, but we're not in a hurry to get a new album out," explains Mark. "We just want to make sure it's something special - there's no point in putting out an average record."

This summer, the band will be touring several UK festivals, including the Shrewsbury and Moseley Folk Festivals in the Midlands. Earlier in the year, they also performed at Derbyshire's Bearded Theory. Having begun their career with a big following amongst travellers on the free festival scene, and twice gone on to smash records for drawing the biggest ever crowds at Glastonbury's Pyramid and Avalon stages, music festivals have always seemed a natural home for The Levellers.

"They can be really special events," says Chadwick. "You never know what you're going to get, and quite a lot of the time, you'll find there are people there who've never seen you before, which is great. There's always a buzz from that - when you just play your own gigs, you're always preaching to the converted, to an extent."

As well as appearing at events across the country, since 2003, the band have also run their own non-commercial Beautiful Days Festival in Devon. The proliferation of music festivals during the last decade or so might have resulted in a rather crowded market place, but enthusiasm for them doesn't appear to have waned.

"People don't seem to mind - they're still going and it's a big business. We sell our festival out without even advertising it, but we're in quite a fortunate position there because it can be risky. Often people think it's a quick way of making money, but to be honest, it's not really a way of making any money at all. Not if you do it properly, anyway - if you don't want to treat people horribly and have terrible infrastructure and bad food and



rubbish toilets and herd them around. It's just ripping people off, and long-term that's not a great idea - those kinds of events tend to disappear quite quickly."

That being said, while the ranks of independent festivals have been growing, it's still the larger, better advertised events that tend to dominate, something also true in other aspects of the music industry. It's hard to get away from the fact that popular music is more managed and manufactured than ever, which poses the question of whether a boundary-pushing, genre-defying, outspoken band like The Levellers would be able to reach as many people if they were starting out today.

"It is difficult now. I mean, it takes money. I appreciate you can just about do all right on your own with the internet and gigging, but to actually reach a wide audience and get really well known does require investment from a record company, and they just don't seem to do that much now. They'll do it for pop music, but they won't really do it for anything else."

It's perhaps partly down to this shift that there's been a noticeable decline in the number of overtly political and countercultural acts emerging in recent years, at least amongst those achieving widespread recognition. This is despite the fact that our current political landscape is characterised by a similar polarisation to that which prompted a creative backlash in the '80s and early '90s.

"There's good music, but the lyrical content I do find generally lacking across the board. You can find it in some British rap music, but

not that much. I just find it disappointing. And surprising, actually, because there's plenty of scope. There's a lot to write about. We're living in a very scary world with a lot of injustices right now, and I don't really understand why people aren't singing about it."

The Levellers' belief in the importance of speaking up for ordinary people ties them in with a long folk tradition that has historically served to give voice to those who might otherwise have been silenced. At the 2011 BBC Radio Two Folk Awards, they received the Roots Award for outstanding contribution to folk music from a grassroots level upwards. Though folk is only one aspect of their distinctive style, which has always resisted easy categorisation, the band have lately been strengthening their connection to the genre, working with Sean Lakeman to produce their albums and collaborating with the likes of Bellowhead and Billy Bragg on new versions of their earlier hits.

"We love folk music - we always have. Back in the day it was a dirty word but it's not any more. But again, folk music is traditionally the music of protest, a kind of descriptive narrative of the times, and I do think that's missing in folk at the moment. It's all very nicey-nicey."

In 2010, Chadwick also made his solo debut with All The Pieces, following this up with a second album, Moment, in 2014.

"I still feel more at home with the band, to be honest, but I like doing solo stuff. It's just different. It's great getting to work with different musicians after 27 years. And it's freeing - it frees me up to write in a different way. I can be more expressive and personal, I suppose."

Since recording their last studio album, Static On The Airwaves, in 2012, The Levellers have been the subject of a documentary film directed by Chumbawamba's Dunstan Bruce. Primarily told from the perspective of the charismatic bassist and album artist Jeremy Cunningham, it tells the story of the band's rise to success from 1988 to '98.

"We thought it was about time, actually! It doesn't cover everything of course - it's not like a typical 'rock-u-mentary'. It's got more of a narrative to it, which makes it a better film. Making it was quite easy really. We gave him complete carte blanche to do whatever he wanted. We didn't want to influence it in any way - so if he saw us as a horrible bunch, that's how we would've come across. Fortunately, I think we come across pretty well!"

Today, after more than 25 years in the business, The Levellers continue to inspire new listeners with songs that seem just as important and relevant as ever. During their time together, they've seen a whole generation grow up with their music, and even begin to introduce a new one to the fold.

"It's a very broad church, our audience. As a band I think we're quite unique in that respect. We get everyone from eight-year-olds to 80-year-olds coming along to our gigs. It's really great!"

The Levellers play Shrewsbury Folk Festival on Monday 29 August and Moseley Folk Festival on Friday 2 September.

There have certainly been times when I've been very happy to say, 'Of course I'd like to stay and help out with that plumbing crisis, but Bromsgrove awaits!""

Just The Tonic

Just The Tonic began in Nottingham over 20 years ago and has now taken over the Jongleurs site in Birmingham.

The popular event this month features the highly rated Markus Birdman, a comedian who firmly believes that comedy should always be presented live, in a dingy club, and to no more than 200 people.

With that kind of attitude, he may find it tricky to forge ahead with a television career - but then that's absolutely fine by Markus. Markus is joined on the bill by 'a very special guest' the organisers 'cannot announce'. And by Ray Peacock...

Although best known as one half of the highly rated Peacock & Gamble double-act, Ray's no stranger to flying solo as a comedian. He also writes, acts and presents, and lists his passions as The Muppets, Lemony Snicket, Star Wars and Les Dawson.

Completing the line-up is well-established funnyman Luke Toulson, a regular Edinburgh Festival contributor with a refreshingly down-to-earth style of delivery.

Chaplin

Silent-era movie star Charlie Chaplin died almost 40 years ago at the age of 88. Since that time and not surprisingly, his star has faded considerably. His most famous films, meanwhile - made in Hollywood during his halcyon days of the 1920s and '30s - have all but disappeared from television screens. So this new musical play offers a useful reminder of just how talented, feted and remarkable Chaplin actually was. The show follows the London-born actor from the dark streets of Victorian England to the glitz and glamour of Tinseltown in the Roaring '20s. Monkeyshine Theatre's well-reviewed 'feast for the senses' blends poetry, dance, shadow play, puppetry and projection to tell the story of a magical creature who likes to collect things.

"A candle holds the magic of a birthday party," explains the company, "a teddy bear holds a child's fear of the dark, a grain of sand carries the freedom of a midnight swim. Losha is a rich and thoughtful play that captures the heart and stirs the memory." The production is presented as part of On The Edge - a world festival of theatre for young audiences.

He also wrote Father Christmas Needs A Wee!, a musical version of which, performed by TaleGate Theatre Productions, has done great business both at the Edinburgh Fringe and out on tour. This new adaptation of another Allan children's book is presented by the selfsame company. It finds the villagers who live beneath a giant's house suddenly compromised by the arrival in their midst of an enormous runaway toilet roll...





Bert Hackett: The Gemini Years




Following the recent passing of Bert Hackett, mac Birmingham presents a timely tribute to the former Birmingham Post cartoonist, whose professional pseudonym was Gemini. The exhibition of his best-loved drawings follows a major retrospective held at mac in 2013, which celebrated his 80th birthday.


Between 1966 and 2008, Hackett's daily cartoons were well known and respected by readers of the paper. During his 42 years at the Post, the artist worked with over a dozen editors and produced more than 10,000 cartoons, finally departing from the paper shortly before its relocation to Fort Dunlop.

Born in Balsall Heath and subsequently a long-term resident in Moseley, Hackett was initially reluctant to take up the daily cartoonist role at the Post, but was eventually persuaded by his business partner and fellow cartoonist Graham Gavin, with whom he coined the Gemini name. The two began by sharing the role, taking it in turns and each producing a cartoon every other day. When Gavin dropped out eight years later, Hackett took on the demanding job full-time.

After a four-year battle with prostate cancer, the popular cartoonist died on Friday 8 April this year. Said Birmingham Post Features Editor Sarah Probert: "Bert's enormous contribution to the Birmingham Post will never be forgotten."

Antiques For Everyone

NEC, Birmingham, Thurs 21 - Sun 24 July

With more than 200 dealers showcasing their wares, Antiques For Everyone is one of the largest events of its kind in the UK. This latest show, one of three taking place this year, features an exhibition exploring the history of Birmingham's highly successful 19th and early 20th century pen trade. At the height of the trade, the city was producing around 1.5 billion pen nibs in 100,000 different

varieties from more than 100 factories.

Curated by Birmingham's Pen Museum, the exhibition celebrates the lives of the manufacturers and workers who helped place the city at the centre of a worldwide trade. The display is presented at Antiques For Everyone ahead of next month's Heritage Lottery-funded relaunch of the pen museum.

As well as the exhibition, other connected highlights include a specialist talk focusing on the important place of the pen in the city's commercial heritage, and a review of the pens featured in Birmingham-based BBC drama series Peaky Blinders (pictured).

The SBT is an independent charity which looks after five unique properties: Shakespeare's birthplace itself; Hall's Croft, the home of the bard's daughter, Susanna; Anne Hathaway's Cottage; Mary Arden's Farm - the childhood home of Shakespeare's mother; and, from the 1st of this month, Shakespeare's New Place, providing visitors with the chance 'to walk in Shakespeare's footsteps and meet the man behind the works'.



Dudley Canal Trust

Created to protect and preserve the famous network of tunnels, the Trust runs regular guided boat trips. The excursions are accompanied by videos, lifelike reconstructions and impressive light and music shows. The Trust re-invests any trading surplus into the maintenance of the tunnels and their environment, to ensure that visitors can continue to enjoy and appreciate 420 million years of living history.

The festival features a wide range of hands-on workshops, all of which are suitable for children aged three and older. Activities include the chance to create a unique fantasy car using paper cups and the opportunity to find out what it was like to drive a bus through the streets of London almost 100 years ago. There's also a clay-modelling workshop with expert model makers from Aardman - the creators of Shaun The Sheep and Wallace & Gromit - and live entertainment from local percussionist Richard Grundon, who'll be creating music by drumming with car parts.

Our pick of top places to visit this Summer

The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery

Highlights of a visit to this wellregarded museum, widely considered to be one of Britain's best, include the chance to view the world's greatest collection of Staffordshire ceramics, a World War Two Spitfire and numerous items from the Staffordshire Hoard. There's also a secret garden - 'a sensory oasis with plants and fungi to smell and touch' - a unique collection of artwork by painters including Picasso, Durer and Degas, and the opportunity to explore the wildlife, landscape and geology of The Potteries region.



Croome Park

The legendary Lancelot
'Capability' Brown was the man
responsible for designing Croome
Court and park, a task he undertook at the behest of the sixth Earl
of Coventry in the mid-18th century. It was Brown's first landscape
design and first major architectural project

A popular National Trust destination, the park features a manmade lake and river, gatehouses, a church, a grotto, follies and numerous statues and temples. There are also four eye-catching buildings - Pirton Castle, Panorama Tower, Dunstall Castle and Park Seat. These were strategically built in particular areas of the park to draw visitors' eyes towards the wider landscape.

Newport Show

Chetwynd Deer Park, Newport, Sat 9 July

Shropshire's Newport Show this year includes a new Festival of Food.

The popular event is introducing a pop-up street food area and a dedicated Little Foodies marquee for children wishing to try their hand at cooking.

The show's existing food theatre has been increased in size and will feature demonstrations from local chefs and Great British Bake Off winner Nadiya Hussain.

Commenting on the new addition to the annual event, the show's Festival of Food Chairman, Tony Asson, said: "With Newport Show's agricultural roots, food production and local produce has always played an important part in our event, to encourage greater understanding of the journey from farm to fork.

The Newport Show's 2016 programme also includes a host of family entertainment, a focus on horticulture, a craft fair, a dog show, and strongly contested livestock and equine competitions.



The Shugborough Country Show

Shugborough Estate, Staffordshire, Sat 23 - Sun 24 July

This firm family favourite returns to Shugborough for a sixth year and, as usual, offers a weekend's-worth of lively and imaginative entertainment.

Highlights of the 2016 bash include a sheep show, a sure-to-be-impressive contribution from the Suffolk Punch Heavy Horse Display Team, birds of prey taking to the skies, a dog and duck show, a medieval village, children's entertainment with Devilstick Peat, and arts, crafts, gifts and food marquees.

Sunday visitors to the event can bring along a canine friend and have a go at the Companion Dog Show, all proceeds from which will be donated to Marie Curie Cancer Care.

National Archaeology Weekend

Bordesley Abbey / Forge Mill Needle Museum, Redditch, Sat 16 - Sun 17 July

The 2009 discovery of the Staffordshire Hoard certainly caught the imagination of the nation and stirred a real interest in the subject of archaeology. Little wonder, then, that there are an increasing number of events such as this one, specifically designed to be educational, entertaining and, above all, family friendly.

Weekend visitors to Bordesley Abbey can check out a medieval knight's encampment, settle down to enjoy a spot of medieval storytelling and find out all about the abbey's masonry. They can also drop into the visitor centre, an original reconstructed 16th century barn housing many of the finds that have been excavated over the years.

Game Fair

Ragley Hall, Warwickshire, Fri 29 - Sat 30 July

Recent times have proved somewhat challenging for this well-established show, with the Country Land & Business Association last year announcing that it would no longer be able to run the event. Luckily, new investors came forward towards the end of 2015, ensuring the 58th edition of the game fair could go ahead.

The popular show is visiting Ragley for the third time and is expected to attract more than 100,000 visitors. It features clay shooting, archery, gundog scurries, international championships, fishing, falconry, ferreting and equestrian sports.

Artisan food and drink, shopping opportunities and hands-on outdoor activities are among the event's other attractions.
Ragley will also host the 60th anniversary show in 2018.

Our pick of top places to visit this Summer

Birmingham Botanical Gardens


Opened in 1832, the 15-acre Birmingham Botanical Gardens has changed very little in its near-200-year history. The gardens feature four glasshouses - tropical, subtropical, Mediterranean and arid - a wetlands enclosure and a seasonal butterfly house. The venue also boasts in excess of 7,000 different types of plant, and is home to the British National Bonsai Collection and a small number of exotic birds from around the world.



Blists Hill Victorian Town

Blists Hill's sights, sounds, smells and tastes all play their part in recreating a sense of 'life as it would have been in a Victorian town more than a century ago'. One of Ironbridge Gorge's many impressive museums, the town plays host to a community of Victorian characters going about their daily business, in so doing providing visitors with a fascinating insight into a bygone world. The highlights of a trip to the popular visitor attraction are numerous. from journeying around the town on a horse and cart and having fun at the Victorian fairground, to dressing up in the costumes of the day and sampling some traditional, Victorian-style fish and chips.

BANGED UP! IN SHREWSBURY





For the last year, a well-known Shrewsbury landmark, former HM Prison Shrewsbury - or the Dana, as it's affectionately known - has been home to more than a few hair-raising events.

With over 200 years of service, The Dana closed its doors in February 2013.

After much speculation about the building's future, the cobwebs were dusted off, the hinges oiled, and history & heritage tour company Jailhouse Tours took active possession of the decommissioned gaol.

For those of a more daring disposition, A Night In The Dana - an overnight custodial under the watchful eye of the prison guards - may be the experience for you. You and your friends also get the Night Walk, a haunting tour of the prison...

Adventure and thrills await those with the cunning and nerve to breach prison security. Join the Prison Escape and try your luck hiding, bribing and sneaking your way to freedom.

Promising the ultimate in immersive fun is the return of the popular Zombie Lockdown. Carnage and mayhem will ensue as Jailhouse Tours and Immersive Events promise an adrenaline-fuelled experience featuring more than 80 actors, most of whom want to eat you!
