

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

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

JOURNEY OF DISCOVERY

Critically acclaimed theatre company Gecko debut a moving story at Warwick Arts Centre



Geckos are found on every continent except Antarctica (we looked it up), which is probably why Amit Lahav chose to name his theatre company after them, since its work recognises and celebrates the journeys of human beings from all over the world. The company's latest production follows that blueprint but has an especially personal connection to Amit - as he explains to What's On...

Award-winning theatre company Gecko has been making its unique brand of physical theatre for over 20 years. The ensemble merges dance and mime with traditional theatre to tell personal stories with universal themes, performed by and for people from a range of cultures as part of its stated commitment to represent every age, gender and background.

The company's latest production, Kin, takes the true story of one woman's arduous journey to flee persecution and expands it to explore themes of racism, family, migration, empathy and home, as well as asking the question 'Who am I, and where do I belong?'

The piece has an especially personal connection to its writer, director, designer and choreographer, Amit Lahav, as it was inspired by the trek his grandmother made from Yemen to Palestine 90 years ago.

His work always starts with a personal connection, he tells me. "From there, it grows and becomes a personal story of everyone involved - all the performers, everyone I meet, all the workshops and residences I do over the years."

Amit visited his grandmother in Israel in 2017 to talk about the family's hike from North Yemen to Palestine, and although she was living with dementia, he learned enough to make him want to find out more.

"I had to take what I could and then go into my own investigations in terms of talking to other older members of the family and other people who were there, and link that to conversations I'd had with other Jewish scholars that know the story."

Amit also acknowledged that many people who have migrated in a harrowing way ("you're so impoverished, so poor and so desperate") actively try to forget their experiences.

"I've been on a three-year journey talking to people from everywhere about their migration stories, and it isn't always something that people want to cling on to or talk about. It's often very traumatic and often something that's not dealt with. It's not really reflected on consciously, it's something that's bubbling underneath your life and everything you do."

The resonances with modern society, as immigrants continue to risk their lives in search of a better life - and the variety of challenges they face in doing so - make the piece both personal and universal, according to Amit. "All of the performers understand this story very deeply, painfully and personally. They have either personally experienced a very difficult process of immigration - and racism within and through that complex process - or they have a deep sense of those stories through their parents and grandparents."

Working on Kin and thinking about his family background made Amit aware of the significant extent to which he is "a huge salad of migration stories" - a scenario he's keen to acknowledge is hardly unique.

"As soon as you take a couple of steps backwards through time, you become very beautifully aware that everyone is a migrant; everyone has a story. There are lots of people who don't know their migration story, but it's beyond question that everyone has a migration story in the not-too-distant past.

"In one workshop, a woman said to me: 'All my lot are milkmen from Kent!' And I said it's so important that your story, and the way you talk about it, is at the heart of this process as well.

"At the end of the day, this is about empathy. We move about. We've always moved about. It's what human beings have done forever and beyond. So it's about empathising with that and connecting with that. The growth of that empathy should be celebrated, and that's what the play is about."

To lighten the mood slightly (we're both laughing at the notion), how does he translate these stories into physical theatre? Gecko productions typically avoid employing dialogue to shape the narrative.

"In a way I don't think about it too much, because I have a way of beginning a process and allowing the ideas and the material to unfold bit by bit."

Amit admits that he barely knows what the piece will become, even after years of work.

"I can't say: 'This is the piece, this is what it's about.' I know the territory that we're in, and I know where it's come from, but then I'm exploring and asking questions and allowing the thing to emerge."

Kin does contain dialogue - but unless you speak multiple languages you're unlikely to understand it.

"Everyone speaks their mother tongue - or perhaps a tertiary language that they also know - which is important for the piece and also for the style. I'm not trying to have an intellectual, linguistically-based communication and connection with the audience, I'm trying to make a deeply, profound human connection, because I want them to connect with the profundity of those human elements, not with the sophistication of spoken language. I think that provokes an audience to reach in deeper to what's going on."

All of which might sound like a challenge for the average theatre goer. However, Amit is keen to point out that his work isn't just for highbrow audiences. It comes down to managing people's expectations of the experience, something he aims to address within the first 10 or 15 minutes of a production.

"It's nothing to do with being highbrow, it's to do with managing that expectation, because people are perfectly capable of dealing with a set of sensory triggers; it just takes a moment. It's not just in gesture, it's in the soundscape, it's in the composition, it's in the lighting, it's in the props, it's in the set. It's my job to craft a world in which an audience can navigate themselves through it."

With a CV of seven critically acclaimed shows behind him, it's a job Amit has been hugely successful at, which is quite an achievement given that he was potentially going to be a businessman like his father until an audition for Fiddler On The Roof became a lifechanging moment.

"I initially drifted into taking some courses on business studies and stuff, but really it was just a bit of time to sort out who I was. I went for the audition and immediately thought, of course this is who I am. I don't mean a musical theatre performer, just that I'm in a studio with people who want to play.


"What I do is quintessentially who I am, but you can't really train to do what I've ended up doing, so it was always going to take a bit of time to work it out. I'm not trained to write, I'm not trained to direct, I'm not trained to design and I'm not trained to choreograph either."

So the new show could ultimately be a car crash?

"Yeah, absolutely - apologies in advance!"

REVIEW: Host Dining Coventry's Belgrade Theatre presents a brand-new pop-up dining experience

Coventry's Belgrade Theatre is undergoing something of a renaissance at the moment, with new CEO Laura Elliot and Artistic Director Corey Campbell keen to take the venue in a modern new direction.

Among the developments is the launch of pop-up dining events in the venue's screened-off Nineteen 58 restaurant & bar, where the Japandi-inspired design gives an airy, relaxed vibe ideal for such occasions.

"We're really excited by the potential of our new café-bar, and our ambition is to have it as a restaurant space," Laura told me. "We want to curate that in the way we would curate a show, with local chefs and local people who are really passionate about good food."

There's clearly an appetite for it. The first £50 per head dining event, featuring a six-course tasting menu from acclaimed local chef Sarah Jenkins, quickly sold out, and aside from a few teething problems - not literally definitely got things off to a promising start(er).

Those teething issues certainly need ironing out for the followup event though, not least the slow and laboured service - one inexperienced server was never going to be enough in a room with 30 covers and seven courses (if you count the petit fours, which most people grabbed and left with, so late were they served). Having to buy drinks at the bar (a £20 drinks package was available) rather than order at the table is also something that needs addressing.

The latter was almost certainly the result of giving the venue over to an independent operator. Host Dining Coventry effectively used the Belgrade's facilities rather than it being a fullyfledged co-venture, but greater collaboration should be able to overcome the issue.

The situation also led to a bizarre scenario when the waitress brought me a substitute dish because she'd been wrongly told I was a vegetarian and then a non-pork eater, purely based on my first name (it seems there was more than one person named Steve in attendance).

The error apparently occurred as a result of the non-sharing of personal information due to GDPR legislation. It turned out well for me, though, in that I got to sample the scallop replacement (for a vegetarian?) for the intended octopus, which may or may not have been cooked using pork fat. Either way, the scallop version presented, like the octopus, on smashed potatoes with a really tasty piso and saffron aioli dressing - was one of the highlights of an evening that contained a number, from the insanely moreish marmite butter of the first course to the delightful olive oil ice cream of the dessert.

The heavenly former was served with stout and treacle bread. The latter came with apricot compôte and granola, which my partner loved but I didn't think added to (but thankfully didn't detract from) the fabulous flavour of the revelatory ice cream.

Alongside those two delightful creations, we enjoyed an array of wonderfully inventive and immaculately presented dishes. These included:

• Wild mushroom ravioli with parmesan broth and spring onion oil (a genuinely glorious mix of flavours and influences we both grabbed spoons to slurp down the broth)

• Slow braised pig's cheek with onion ash and pickled pear (beautiful melt-in-the-mouth meat with a curl of crunchy onion that looked like an albino pork scratching)

• Vintage Cheddar and whipped

Stilton cheeses with poppy seed crackers (my partner adored the Stilton but it was whey - ahem too rich for my palate)

• A selection of petit fours (boxed-up treats including a fennel-infused lollipop and a small plastic bag of sherbet that you'd never get through customs)

The quality and creativity on display made it easy to see why Sarah Jenkins is so highly regarded - she's catered for touring bands, hosted recipe classes and produces bespoke tasting menus alongside Tobias Reutt of Earlsdon Supper Club while the cheery, chatty atmosphere created by satisfied diners suggests this rehearsal definitely set the stage for a longterm engagement.

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REVIEW: Napton Cidery Award-winning venue takes pop-up country pub grub to an exciting new level...

It's fair to say it's been something of an eventful summer for the team at Napton Cidery. After scooping up not one, not two, but three Great Taste Awards, a coveted International Cider Challenge Silver and Bronze Award and an Artisan Drink Producer Award at the 2022 Coventry & Warwickshire Foodie event earlier this year, the family-run farmhouse cidery is deservedly reaping the fruits of its labours. Its success comes thanks to a dedicated local fanbase, an expanding list of local distributors, and a longstanding commitment to sustainably produced British farming.

Not bad for an initiative which began with brewing cider from a single apple tree back in 2015!

Flying high on the back of their recent successes, owners Charlotte and Jolyon Olivier have been quick to capitalise on the cidery's winning combination of relaxed, rural surroundings and exceptional hospitality by presenting an expanding programme of special events. These include a comedy night, regular cider talks & tastings, live music, quiz and cocktail nights, and a family fun day. The latest addition to their offer is the weekly Thursday Night Supper Club.

Hosted in collaboration with Inspirado - a new, personalised dining experience founded upon the principles of 'travel, making new friends and understanding new cultures' - the Supper Club offers a unique concept in popup dining. Serving up freshly prepared meals in front of a group of no more than 20 to 30 diners, Inspirado's strength lies not only in its delicious, homecooked menu but also its intimacy.

Enter the taproom at 6pm and, two delicious courses and a glass or two of Lost Apple cider later, you head for the exit with two, three, maybe even four new friends.

Inspirado's concept is refreshingly novel - from the communal dining tables right through to the choice of menu. In our case, this consisted of a Three Mustard Pork Stroganoff served with basmati rice followed by a deliciously light lemon cheesecake, priced at £17.

With the conversation (and

cider) in full flow, guests at our table included day-trippers travelling Warwickshire's historic waterways via canalboat, Napton village 'regulars' based just a few farmhouses away, two Northamptonshire teachers enjoying their final few days of freedom before returning to school for the new term, and a retired couple celebrating their wedding anniversary.

The event was spread across a leisurely three (to four) hours, against the sunlit backdrop of Napton's rural farmyard setting. There was something so simple yet so refreshing about the experience of enjoying hearty, flavoursome food in the company of likeminded diners something much missed over the last two-and-a-half years since the advent of Covid-19.

Our chef and the founder of Inspirado, Samuel Chamberlain, explained that it is precisely the joy born of 'chance social encounters' that he hopes his pop-up dining concept will provide - and I, for one, wish him every possible success.

With pop-up menus ranging from the 1980s-themed Prawn

Cocktail, Coq Au Vin and Black Forest Gateaux, Bombay-inspired Chicken Tikka, Goan Fish Curry and Mango Mousse (both available at the nearby Holly-Bush in Prior Marston), right through to tried-and-tested classic Three Meat Lasagne, Big Italian Salad and Tiramisu, Inspirado's unique business model takes pop-up country pub grub to an exciting new level.

With telephone numbers exchanged and after several pints of Napton's award-winning draft cider, it was time to make our way home. And yes, whilst my memory might have been a little hazy after that fourth and final glass of Recipe No5 Blackcurrant Cider, what was clear was just how much I and my fellow diners had taken from the evening. Here's to another hit night in the making!

Aurora Orchestra Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Fri 7 October

Aurora Orchestra is the first ensemble in the world to present whole symphonies entirely from memory. As innovations in classical music go, that's a pretty impressive one and makes for some electrifying performances. Here helmed by Principal Conductor Nicholas Collon, Aurora present three pieces with a distinctly French flavour: Thomas Adès' Three Studies From Couperin, Ravel's Piano Concerto in G and Symphonie Fantastique by Berlioz.

Orchestra Of The Swan

Stratford Play House, Stratford-upon-Avon, Sun 9 October; The Courtyard, Hereford, Tues 11 October

As well as being much admired for their championing of new music, having presented more than 70 world premieres, the Stratford-based Orchestra of the Swan are also held in high regard for their performances of works by legendary composers.

This latest concert sees them teaming up with violinist and former BBC New Generation Artist Tai Murray (pictured), who will be performing Bruch's Violin Concerto No1 in G minor. The programme also features Anna Meredith's Fringeflower and two works by Mendelssohn: Hebrides Overture and Symphony No3.



Ex Cathedra: King For A Day...

Birmingham Town Hall, Sun 9 October



Jeffrey Skidmore once again takes the baton to conduct Birmingham's highly rated early music ensemble, this time in a concert that kickstarts the 2022/23 season. Presenting 'music for royal occasions', the programme features Handel's celebratory Georgian Coronation Anthems and compositions by Michel-Richard de Lalande - a favourite composer of the Sun King, Louis XIV. Also included is Departure Of The Queen Of Sheba by Alec Roth, the composer of 2009's Earthrise, a work commissioned by Ex Cathedra to mark the 40th anniversary of the Moon landing.

London Concertante: Vivaldi's Four Seasons

Worcester Cathedral, Fri 28 October

While it's a given that they take the business of musicmaking extremely seriously, there's



certainly nothing stuffy about the London Concertante.

Indeed, 50 percent of people who attend a performance by this 31-year-old chamber orchestra are first-time classical music concert-goers - a statistic which speaks volumes for the ensemble's commitment to remaining at all times light-of-touch and refreshingly accessible.

The ever-busy chamber orchestra here get their teeth into Vivaldi's Four Seasons - as well as works by Bach, Handel and Mozart - in a concert that's being publicised as 'a romantic candlelit experience'.

Brodsky Quartet

Royal Pump Rooms, Leamington Spa, Fri 7 October

This hugely admired quartet has performed more than 2,000 concerts and released in excess



of 50 recordings since its formation half a century ago. The evening's programme features: Borodin's Scherzo from Les Vendredis, Beethoven's Quartet In F and Shostakovich's Quartet No3 in F.

Pomegranate Piano Trio

Bromsgrove School, Fri 21 October

Violinist Fenella Barton, cellist Rebecca Hepplewhite and pianist Andrew West first performed together as the Pomegranate Piano Trio eight years ago. Since that time they've established a UKwide reputation for presenting imaginative and engaging programmes of classical music.

This Bromsgrove concert sees them performing Debussy's Piano Trio in G Major - written when its composer was still a teenager - and Faure's Piano Trio in D Minor - written when its composer was almost 80.

Ravel's Piano Trio completes the programme.

Gigs

Urban Folk Quartet

Huntingdon Hall, Worcester, Fri 21 October

The Urban Folk Quartet are like no other folk band. With Birmingham's vibrant and diverse music scene having a significant influence on their work, they dabble in all kinds of sounds, from funk grooves and Middle Eastern melodies to afrobeat and north Indian rhythms. They tug their collective forelock in the direction of more traditional folk music too, describing their sound as 'fiddle-led' and drawing 'heavily on celtic dance forms and traditional song'.



The Magpies

Temperance, Leamington Spa, Mon 24 October Showcasing a unique blend of transatlantic folk music, talented three-piece The Magpies comprises award-winning guitarist, banjo player & singer Bella Gaffney, clawhammer banjo player & singer Kate Griffin and acclaimed fiddle player & tunesmith Holly Brandon. The trio's debut album, Tidings released in June 2020 to considerable critical acclaim - features material deeply rooted in the traditions of their native Yorkshire and draws on their experiences as women living in the 21st century.





Seasick Steve

hmv Empire, Coventry, Tues 4 October

Seasick Steve is this month hosting a special album-launch show to celebrate the release of Only On Vinyl.

No CD. No digital. No Spotify or iTunes. Just standard black and limited-edition blue vinyl. You won't find it anywhere else. Commenting on the release, the blues

musician best known for playing on personalised guitars said: "I just wanted it to be like it used to. Wanna buy a record? Go to the record store! It's an amazing thing to do. Just go, look around, feel the vibe. Then you pick out a record. Then you got something *real* in your hands, instead of in some cloud. It's really yours. For real. I swear."

Hayseed Dixie

The Assembly, Leamington Spa, Thurs 13 October

Hayseed Dixie was formed one summer's day in 2000 when John Wheeler and now exmember Mike Daly 'drank roughly enough whiskey to float a battleship from the Florida Coast over to Portugal and back'. They then decided to play around in John's studio.

Although the band, which has endured multiple line-up changes since their inception, produced some pretty unforgettable and comically crude songs, including I'm Keeping Your Poop In A Jar and She Was Skinny When I Met Her, Hayseed Dixie are probably best known for their rollicking rockgrass covers.

Tarragon

The Tin Music & Arts, Coventry, Fri 7 October

Tarragon is the brainchild of Callum Pickard, who's self-funded his music project by working as a Deliveroo cyclist in his home town of Coventry. His debut record, I've Just Seen A Scene - released in June deals with the emotional growing pains and frustrations that come with maturing into young adulthood.

The Unthanks

Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Sun 16 October

The Unthanks have been described as "a take on tradition that flips so effortlessly between jazz, classical, ambient and postrock, it makes any attempt to put a label on them a waste of time".

Tyneside sisters Rachel and Becky visit Coventry this month - alongside their 11piece band - in support of new album Sorrows Away, a record billed as more joyful and uplifting than any previous Unthanks offering.



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Faith, Family and #fakingit

An updated version of Tartuffe lands in its spiritual home of Birmingham this month...

Moliere's 17th-century play, Tartuffe, has been given a modern-day twist by writing partnership Anil Gupta and Richard Pinto. Directed by Iqbal Khan, the show opens at the Birmingham Rep this month following a highly acclaimed pre-pandemic run at the Royal Shakespeare Company. What's On recently caught up with Iqbal to find out more...

It has been a busy year for Iqbal Khan since he was named associate director of Birmingham Rep.

He directed the 25th anniversary revival of the comedy East Is East, which played to full houses both in Birmingham and at the National Theatre in London. He was artistic director of the Commonwealth Games Opening Ceremony, which was watched by millions worldwide. And he is currently in rehearsal for a revival of his hit comedy, Tartuffe - previously seen at the Royal Shakespeare Company's Swan Theatre in 2019 - which is opening in its spiritual home of Birmingham at The Rep mid-month.

An updated version of the classic 17thcentury French comedy by Molière, the play tells the story of fraudster Tartuffe, who inveigles his way into a family, duping them with his false piety. But where the original Tartuffe is an apparently good Roman Catholic, in this new adaptation, the story is transferred to a modern Pakistani Muslim family living in Sparkhill in Birmingham.

Adapted by Anil Gupta and Richard Pinto, whose CVs include television's Goodness Gracious Me, The Kumars At No 42, Citizen Khan and The Office, the show premiered at Stratford-upon-Avon to critical and audience acclaim.

Iqbal, who directed the Stratford show and returns to the production for Birmingham, says its success lies both in Molière's story and its timely update.

"I think the original play is the first great sitcom, or comedy that has a sitcom structure, because it's the perfect satire of family - all the various tensions within a family, it does that brilliantly.

"But it's quite a dangerous satire because the religious framing of it makes the line that the comedy walks quite edgy. I think what we did when moving it to a modern Islamic community in Birmingham gives it that kind of tension that releases both the danger within the play but also its humour.

"It worked really well in Stratford because it felt like it did speak to the world at that moment. And what was really gratifying about that audience in Stratford was that many of them didn't have the experience we were portraying in the play. They were international or older white people coming to see it, but they seemed to really identify with the human story of the play.

"This is a family which is fractured, and into that fracture comes this figure, Tartuffe, who exploits everyone's weakness. That's a story which I think anyone from whatever community or heritage can identify with."

The show was scheduled to play The Rep in spring 2020 but was delayed by Covid and lockdown. Now the team are looking forward to finally bringing it to Birmingham, where it forms part of the Birmingham Comedy Festival.

"Anil and Richard wrote it so specifically for Birmingham, and yes, it worked brilliantly at the RSC, but I can't wait to have Birmingham audiences looking at a story that is set here and which is really precisely observed.

"I'm from Birmingham, and we worked really hard to represent this community, not as a homogenous community but as a collection of quite a lot of different voices, so I think there will be lots of recognition here."

As part of the modernisation of the story, the women have been given more prominence.

"Many of the women are a bit functional in the original, but in our version we've shown all the women in this piece as being incredibly strong and complex, having agency, and given them a lot more of the story.

"I'm hoping that those who know Molière's Tartuffe will be surprised by the journey we've taken and our take on those characters."

Four years after its premiere, the team are also making some tweaks to the production.

"We were already changing it a little bit last time we were due to stage it at The Rep, just sharpening it for Birmingham, making it tighter and stronger. We will continue to do that and update a few of the lines.

"Unfortunately a lot of the things we were satirising four years ago feel even more pertinent than they did then. Tartuffe is a conman exploiting the fractures in terms of identity, how people relate to the media, our relationship to religion, our weaknesses, our scepticism about politics and whether politicians represent us." Iqbal stresses, though, that it is Tartuffe's duplicity which is under the spotlight, not faith itself.

"We've been very careful not to attack religion. It's those who use religion to manipulate others that is the focus of our satire. In our version, we have lots of different kinds of Islam represented, and I hope respectfully and with real insight."

Iqbal was also keen to represent the city's different communities with authenticity in the Commonwealth Games Opening Ceremony at Alexander Stadium in July.

"I wanted to show Birmingham as an extraordinary, vital place that's a meeting place of different kinds of communities and has been enriched by that. The sense that I got was that Brummies who came were overwhelmed by it and really proud that I represented lots of different experiences.

"They felt I had captured something of those experiences and really shouted our qualities to the world - and the world, I think, was dazzled by the vitality of this place."


Iqbal believes the arts - whether it be a huge Games ceremony or a theatre production, can open doors into other communities and break down barriers.

"Any great play comes from a very specific place and looks at a very specific bit of the human experience, but if it's told well, that resonates with so many parallel dynamics in other communities and other families. Ultimately the great gift of theatre is the consoling sense that other people are going through what we are going through. And also that it can enlighten us and educate us about the differences between people, and battle the ignorance. It's when we don't know that we become afraid, and I think theatre really helps bridge the ignorance and shows us consoling similarities in different experiences.

"Tartuffe, a play that was written in the 17th century and in a Christian context, can be infinitely interpreted and represented. It's fantastic for us to take the opportunity and give it a Pakistani, modern Birmingham perspective, and help share truths about that experience through this play."

Tartuffe shows at The Rep, Birmingham, from Fri 14 October to Sat 5 November

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Harry Hill

Dudley Town Hall, Sat 8 October; Wolverhampton Grand Theatre, Wed 26 October; Crewe Lyceum Theatre, Fri 28 October; The Alexandra, Birmingham, Sun 6 November

Harry Hill's most high-profile days might well be behind him (long term, it's a tough ask to retain a position at the top of the notoriously greasy comedy pole). He's still a very funny man, though, and will probably be able to wear big collars and a stupid grin for the rest of his career without anybody complaining that it's become boring and old hat.

A one-time doctor, Harry's decision to prescribe comedy as the best medicine is one for which his legion of fans continue to be exceedingly grateful.

His latest show, Pedigree Fun, features baby elephant Sarah, Ian The Information Worm and Stouffer The Cat.



Desi Central Comedy Night

Newhampton Arts Centre, Wolverhampton, Fri 7 October

"We're still in a country where white men dominate many industries," says BBC Asian Network's Noreen Khan, who regularly features on the bill for this ever-popular night, "so it's very important to have visible, diverse role models to help inspire others and to reflect the world we live in." Desi Central certainly does that, providing a showcase not only for Noreen but plenty of other hugely talented laughter merchants. This particular gig features sets from Tommy Sandhu, Kane Brown, Farhan Solo and Muhsin Yesilada. An evening of high-quality comedy is pretty much a guarantee.

Dave Gorman

Dave Gorman's idea of standup comedy seems to be that as long as there's room for him to stand up, he'll do some comedy!



Why else would this intrepid funnyman have made the decision a few years back to play not only 2,000-seater theatres when he headed out on tour but also 30-seat village halls, a barn and even a railway dining car! Dave is still touring, but is now being a bit more selective about the venues! He stops off in the Midlands this month with new show Powerpoint To The People. Award-winning Paul Tonkinson, who's perhaps best known from The Big Breakfast and The Sunday Show. Regularly booked by the UK Armed Forces, Paul was the first comic to perform in Iraq after the war officially ended, and has used his experiences there as an inspiration for his comedy: "When I told my wife I'd spent much of the time lying on the floor, all I got in response was 'well we all like a lie down, don't we?""

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Sofie Hagen

Danish feminist comedian and one-time selfharming Westlife fan Sofie Hagen makes a welcome return to the Midlands with a brand-new show that's positively bursting at the seams with 'big jokes and fat punchlines'.

"This is a collection of fat jokes and unforgettable moments that you can laugh at without feeling like sh*t," explains her publicity. "Come as you are and enjoy an actual fat person at the top of her game." Sofie's gag-bag includes the following two jokes: "I have the confidence to text a man first. And second. And third. And fourth. And fifth. And sixth. And seventh. Basically, until he answers," and "The question you always have to ask yourself is: 'Is my depression back or am I just hungry?""



Jessica Fostekew

"I'm not a comedian in order to abuse people or to get laid," Jessica wrote in the Huffington Post. "I want to make people laugh. I'm there to be judged on my jokes. I've had everything shouted at me, from 'My tits are better than yours' to 'When's the raffle?' but it's never been meant to hurt me."



Joanne McNally

Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Fri 21 October; Birmingham Hippodrome, Sun 30 October; The Place, Telford, Sat 5 November


Now in her late 30s 'with no husband, no kids, no pension and no plan', Joanne McNally is posing a host of burning questions in her new touring show, The Prosecco Express: "If I don't birth anything, who will be obligated to watch me die so that I don't have to do it alone? When a man on a dating app identifies as 'spiritual', is it safe to assume he has the personality of a spoon? If you do all your drinking in the bath, can you write it off as self-care?"

Joanne's overnight success as a stand-up comedian was a long time in the making almost a decade, in fact. When it arrived, it came in the form of a lucrative book deal, a hugely successful podcast boasting two million downloads every month, and some seriously impressive ticket sales for The Prosecco Express, which she's bringing to the above-listed Midlands venues this autumn. "One of the things I love about comedy is that you can see and track your progress. It's like weight loss, but in a healthier way. I used to be addicted to losing weight, but now I'm addicted to progressing in comedy."

Isy Suttie

Elf Lyons

Elf Lyons is certainly ploughing an interesting comedy furrow. Her latest show, which she's bringing to Birmingham midmonth, has actually been inspired by novelist Stephen King and is described as 'part mad-clown comedy spectacle, part Hammer Horror'. Elf cites King as one of her two favourite people (not including friends, family and fellow comedians), the other being the late Angela Carter, also a novelist -"because they are both there for me when I need to escape."



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Rising Star

Award-winning comedian Celya AB talks to What's On as she prepares to return to her adoptive city to appear at the Birmingham Comedy Festival

It's been a whirlwind few years in the young life of comedian Celya AB. Originally from Paris with French-Algerian roots, she's been embraced as an adopted Brummie ever since she moved to the city aged 19. Three years later, she decided to try her hand at comedy, and just two years after that won the Birmingham Breaking Talent Award at the Birmingham Comedy Festival. Since then, she's reached the finals of the Funny Women Awards (2019), and BBC New Comedy Awards (2021) and won the Chortle Award for Best Newcomer (2022). Not bad considering she'd never even contemplated comedy as a career until five years ago.

The friendly comic laughs at the absurdity of it all, but admits there was a definite lightbulb moment - and the kick-start challenge of a friend - that effectively changed her life.

"I've always loved comedy, but I'd never seen stand-up in real life. (In 2017) I was back home, and I saw it in one of the first comedy clubs in Paris. There was this show where I saw acts doing 10-minute sets and I thought 'I could do that.'

"I kept meaning to do it but kept backing out at the last moment and never booked a gig until I bumped into (comedian) Karen Bailey when I was really hungover and pretending to write jokes. She asked me what I was doing, and when she saw I was writing jokes, she said 'you've got three days because I'm putting you on my gig.' So basically it took me being bullied into it!"

After spending the next three days writing material ("I was scribbling like a maniac - I was only doing a five-minute set, but I must've written enough for 25!"), Celya made her stage debut and instantly knew she'd found her calling.

"I was so nervous, but then the first time I got a laugh I couldn't stop thinking about it and just fell in love with it."

She admits that overcoming the hurdle of being able to perform - and be funny - in English was a huge victory in itself.

"I was always funny with my friends in France, but I didn't think I was allowed to be funny in another language, so when I came to England I just stopped being funny!"

Which is not to say she wasn't having fun - in fact, quite the opposite. She'd settled in Birmingham after falling for the city and its people while visiting extended family to celebrate her 19th birthday. She came for three weeks and never went back.

"I just fell in love with the people - everyone is so friendly. I live in London now, and I can see the difference. I wish everyone in the UK would be as friendly as Brummies, but they're not. Starting there was a very soft landing to moving to England."

Birmingham reciprocated that love when Celya won the Breaking Talent Award at the city's Comedy Festival, a prize she hadn't realised she could be nominated for.

"I remember thinking I don't qualify as a Birmingham comedian because I'm French, but I guess I'd been on that circuit since I started, so I must've counted!

"I didn't expect to win it at all, but it was great because the Birmingham circuit is so good and being among those people meant a lot. The Glee Club in Birmingham is one of my favourite venues around the UK, so it felt very special - and it's always nice to win stuff, isn't it?"

Celya's career has been on an upward curve ever since. In addition to the award recognition mentioned earlier, she's made a host of TV appearances, including Yesterday, Today And The Day Before (Comedy Central) and Festival Of Funny Live (BBC). She's also been a guest on The Guilty Feminist and Global Pillage and is a regular writer for BBC Radio Four's The News Quiz.

Her first full-length show, Swimming, enjoyed a sold-out run at this year's Edinburgh Fringe ("a rite of passage - you have to do it and get it out of the way"). As much as she's looking forward to performing the show at the Birmingham Comedy Festival, she's already desperate to move on to the next one. "I originally thought Swimming would be a combination of everything I'd written, but it ended up being mostly new material. I'm very excited that it went well, but I'm already thinking about the second one and how I can improve. It's so important to know that this is all a process, and that you get better at it the more you do it."

Even though she's now based in London ("I can get a lot of gigs down there without leaving the city"), she admits she learned a lot from developing and honing her craft in the Midlands.

"When I started, there were expectations that I'd just do jokes about being French, which don't go down too well if you do them too much - that's one thing I learned from being in Birmingham.


"Birmingham audiences tend to be very honest, which I think makes you be a better stand-up. And because it's the middle of the country, you get a microcosm of the whole country in terms of what people like, if that makes sense - like a Venn diagram. If something works in Birmingham, then chances are it'll work in Manchester, Liverpool and London.

"When I'm in London I can do jokes just about being in London, but then I can't take them anywhere, and I'm really interested in jokes being sharp and working everywhere. It makes the writing process a bit slower, but it's super-important, and I learned that from starting off here."

She's also delighted to be back where it all began - both the city and the festival.

"I love the Birmingham Comedy Festival, and (founder) Dave Freak is a wonderful, wonderful man. I recently did a set at the Moseley Folk Festival, and every time I'm in Birmingham I realise I miss it so much, so I'm really glad to be back."

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JIVE TALKIN'

Hit disco-era musical Saturday Night Fever - based on the classic 1977 movie of the same name - returns to the Midlands this month, with Jack Wilcox taking the lead role of Tony Manero. What's On caught up with Jack to talk about the challenge of stepping into John Travolta's iconic white suit and dancing shoes...

Bill Kenwright's production of Saturday Night Fever returns to the Midlands this month with a new leading man. Jack Wilcox, fresh from a run in Anything Goes at The Barbican, will be taking on the role of Tony Manero.

The musical, based on the 1977 movie starring John Travolta, follows Tony's story as he fights his way to dancing success.

"He doesn't really have much in his life to write home about," says Jack. "He's had a difficult upbringing, and his father's lost his job. The whole story is about him reaching out for something more, something better and something to give him fulfilment."

The production is set to offer audiences a fun-filled night of high-energy entertainment - complete with an unforgettable soundtrack by the Bee Gees. Featured classics include How Deep Is Your Love?, Night Fever, Jive Talkin', Disco Inferno and Staying Alive.

"I grew up listening to the Bee Gees in the car because my mum loved them," says Jack. "When you listen to them, you can't help but want to move." But the production doesn't shy away from showing the darker side of life. "It's more than just a jukebox musical. It's got a very dense and moving script, which is quite gritty at times. It's reflecting real life in 1970s Brooklyn. It tackles some hard subjects that will really make the audience think."

Jack was keen to bring Travolta's Tony to life but also add his own twist to the character. "What's lovely about this role is that I've been able to really develop the character and get that arc throughout the whole show. The audience sees that journey as well, which makes Tony such a satisfying character to play.

"To be honest, it's also a little daunting; John Travolta is so wonderful in the film, and his career really boomed afterwards - and for good reason. But I wanted to find my own truth within the script. We've tried to reach a happy medium of paying tribute to the musical's origins while also making it our own." Something that will definitely be retained from the film is Travolta's white suit. "I've loved the transformation into Tony, with his iconic suit and the hair. It's been really good fun. One of the most important elements has been the choreography and celebrating this particular period."

Smith

The show's dance routines have been created by choreographer Bill Dreamer. "Bill's invested time into looking at the period, researching the film and examining what the popular moves of the time were. He's very clever. Coming from Anything Goes, it's been great to break out into this 1970s period, where the dance is a lot looser and I can let myself go a bit more. I'm really enjoying that shifting of gear."

"This show introduces people to the backstage world," says Craig. 

Unknown

Old Joint Stock Theatre, Birmingham, Thurs 13 & Fri 14 October; Vesta Tilley Studio, Worcester, Tues 25 & Wed 26 October

Filmmaker Ken Loach - perhaps best known for his 1966 television play about homelessness, Cathy Come Home - has described the stories recounted in Unknown as harrowing, shocking but eloquently told. It's an assessment which speaks volumes for the quality of the play, both in terms of its raw power and profound articulacy. Supported by the Arts Council and The Big Issue, Unknown is a verbatim piece that dramatises the tragic but true story of one young person's journey from an abusive childhood to a life on the streets of Bath - one of the UK's most affluent cities.

The play is presented against the backdrop of a sobering statistic: in just two years, from 2017 to 2019, more than 800 people died while living and sleeping rough on the streets of Great Britain.

Unknown has been written with the assistance of six people who have recent experience of homelessness.

Twopence To Cross The Mersey

Albany Theatre, Coventry, Wed 19 - Fri 21 October; Lichfield Garrick, Sat 22 - Sun 23 October

Helen Forrester's autobiographical play is set in the 1930s and catches up with the teenage Helen as she fights a bitter battle



with her parents for the right to educate herself and go out to work. Following her family's fall from grace and a move from the more affluent south up to Merseyside, Helen is used by her parents as an 'unpaid slave' to look after her siblings. But with Britain on the brink of war, the teenage girl finally finds the chink of light for which she's been searching...

Tartuffe

The Rep, Birmingham, Fri 14 October -Sat 5 November

Described as a wicked comedy about faith, family and #fakingit, this critically acclaimed version of a 17th-century masterpiece brings events bang up to date.

The story centres around the wealthy Pervaiz family. Living in modern-day Birmingham, they have in their midst the charismatic and devout Tahir Taufig Arsuf - or Tartuffe to the sceptical. But is Tartuffe all that he seems and will family life ever be the same again?... Transferring the play's action from the 17th century to the 21st, Anil Gupta and Richard Pinto, the writing team who updated Tartuffe, made the title character a Muslim cleric - and then braced themselves for a backlash that by and large didn't happen. Updating the play in the particular way that they chose - by turning the full glare of the spotlight on the contemporary British Muslim experience - was certainly a bold move, as director Iqbal Khan has acknowledged, but it's one that they've pulled off with real style.

Austentatious

Old Rep, Birmingham, Sat 8 & Sun 9 October

Austentatious visits the Midlands having garnered plenty of praise when it debuted at the Edinburgh Fringe.

Lighthearted and delightfully throwaway, it finds the performers utilising audience suggestions to develop a play that not only pays homage to Jane Austen but also generates plenty of laughter along the way.





'Captivating chemistry, phenomenal physics and bonkers biology' all feature on this particular occasion.



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GETTING INTO MISCHIEF

Erica Whyman, the Royal Shakespeare Company's acting artistic director, talks about Mischief Festival, which this month sees two innovative new works being showcased at the RSC's studio theatre, The Other Place...

What's the story behind the Mischief festivals - how and why did they come into being?

I introduced them to launch the new The Other Place, our studio theatre, in 2014. They are a way of grouping our most adventurous and playful work and plays together and encouraging audiences to see different perspectives on a theme.

How have they developed and evolved over the years?

They have all been different, but I hope each one has spoken of its time. We have shorter lead times in creating the Mischief season of plays and can make sure the work is really responsive to the moment.

What have you learned from previous Mischief festivals?

I've learnt to trust that Mischief is the perfect framing for both light and dark experimentation. Shakespeare used it both ways, mischief to mean violence or injustice as well as to make enjoyable trouble. I think artists need more courage than ever to really express what they think.

What's the process you go through in terms of deciding which plays to perform?

We've used different methods; convening conversations about hot topics, encouraging artists to write fast responses to world events, and commissions with a specific focus. What they all share is a commitment to the present moment, and a desire to reimagine the world.

Is there a theme to this year's festival, and if so, what is it and why was it chosen?

We commissioned and programmed these plays in 2019 in an explicit response to leaving the EU. We wanted to platform stories of small communities dealing with change, with crisis and with division. And we wanted comedies - I was very aware of how few funny writers are given space to develop on significant stages. And our audiences need to laugh....! But we had no idea how very timely those instincts would turn out to be. All communities, neighbourhoods and friendship groups thrust into a pandemic together will recognise themselves in these plays.

How about the plays themselves? Can you tell us a little bit about them...

Ivy Tiller: Vicar's Daughter, Squirrel Killer is about a young woman who has found purpose in a campaign to kill grey squirrels in order to restore red squirrels. But the campaign is over and Ivy can't stop. It's about loneliness and being an outsider but also about the absurdity of human desires and connections... O, Island! is about a small community hit by disastrous floods which, once divided by water, reveals fascist tendencies and extreme behaviour. It is truly a parable for our political times!

Mischief is being held in The Other Place. How does the venue impact the festival and the plays?

The building is a creative, festive space. Somewhere full of energy and distinctly rough and ready, unpretentious. I think that has a positive impact on the work; the audience come in expecting to be surprised, ready to share the space with the artists.

If you had to select one play from previous festivals that's really hit the mark and resonated with you, which would it be and why?

#wearearrested by Can Dundar, adapted by Pippa Hill and Sophie Ivatts. It is the story of Can's imprisonment and facing jumped-up charges as a journalist in Turkey taking courageous risks to tell the truth. It felt important, but also poetic and enthralling. There's a moment when Can dances to Adele with great abandon as he dreams of his wife outside the prison walls and it is absurd, delightful and heartbreaking all at once.

When is Mischief Festival at its best? And has there been a time when you felt it failed to meet expectations?



It is at its best when it provokes conversation, and holds a safe but lively space for debate. So no, it has always done that. Some work has caused more or less debate, some has been strong meat for some, but that's exactly the point. It has been a fearless space to play with form and address content that is hard to grapple with.

If the event is still going in, say, a decade's time, in what ways would you hope it had developed?

I would love to see it become ever-more interdisciplinary, working across digital and irl to offer an international experience of Mischief, wherever you are in the world, and celebrating the evolving nature of theatremaking. And perhaps causing even more enjoyable trouble....

Motionhouse: Starchitects

Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Thurs 27 - Sun 30 October; Birmingham Hippodrome, Fri 3 & Sat 4 February

Leamington-based dance company Motionhouse make a welcome return to Coventry's Warwick Arts Centre this month with a brandnew show.

Telling the story of five youngsters who dream of reaching the moon from their bedroom, Starchitects is the company's first ever production created specifically for children and families. "Full of thrilling surprises, the show is engaging for audiences of all ages," says the company's executive director, Louise Richards. Stan's Cafe's Of All The People In All The World returns to the Midlands

Grains of rice representing abstract human statistics form the basis of a unique performance installation created by Birmingham theatre company Stan's Cafe. Of All The People In All The World returns to the Midlands this autumn having visited cities around the globe since debuting in 2003. What's On recently caught up with Artistic Director James Yarker to find out more about this innovative work of art.

Birmingham-based Stan's Cafe have taken their work, Of All The People In All The World, around the globe since it was premiered in 2003 - and this autumn it will be re-staged at two West Midlands venues.

The show will be free to visit at Coventry's Warwick Arts Centre from 4 to 9 October (it forms part of Warwick Arts Weekender, taking place from the 6th to the 9th), and then visits Birmingham's Midlands Arts Centre (mac) on various dates between 22 October and 6 November.

Of All The People In All The World uses grains of rice to tell stories of people, communities, individuals and groups. Each grain represents one person, with viewers being invited to see themselves represented in the work.

Stan's Cafe Artistic Director James Yarker explains: "What people will see is piles of rice, all of different sizes - some huge, and some actually down to individual grains of rice - all sat on sheets of white paper. And there's a label on them.

"It looks quite attractive sculpturally, as it's a series of almost sand dunes or hills, but when you get close and you start to read the labels, you realise that each pile of rice represents a pile of human beings. So in a way it's a map of the world, in which one grain of rice equals one human being.

"We've chosen which categories sit by which categories to tell the story. So when people arrive, if they're from the local area, they will see the population of their town or city. But then they might also see the number of schoolchildren or teachers or doctors or nurses in that town or city.

"They'll also see national politics played out there and international events represented. They'll see changes over time. You can tell stories, and even jokes, by what you choose to put side by side."

Premiered at Warwick Arts Centre nearly 20 years ago, Of All The People In All The World has been experienced by audiences across Europe, North and South America, Canada, Australia and Japan. And James says people in every community connect with it. "I think it's effective everywhere because it's incredibly simple and understandable. It connects with people's sense of empathy, so even really small children understand the concept. People see themselves relocated within the show, so it's really personal to them and also surprising.

"Its longevity is also because it's a concept which is constantly made anew. If we performed the original version that we did in 2003, then it would look massively dated because we'd be talking about Guantanamo Bay, Gordon Brown and how Britain has only had one woman prime minister.

"But the joy of it is that it can respond to the architecture or setting in terms of being in a specific place at that time. Something can happen in the morning and we can put it in the show straight away."

One of the other reasons for its popularity is that Of All The People In All The World can have different meanings for different visitors.

"People often say, 'what is it - is it a piece of theatre, a performance, an installation, an exhibition?' One of the things that I find reassuring is that people respond with the same level of enthusiasm and empathy and curiosity and passion everywhere we've performed it."

Returning to Warwick Arts Centre is an important milestone for the work.

"That was the first ever venue for the show, but the building has changed since then. It will be strange to be in the same building but with the lay-out being potentially different."

And at mac, the show forms part of the arts centre's 60th birthday celebrations.

"Because of the anniversary, we're looking through their archives to see what's been going on with the history of mac, but we're also taking the opportunity to think about 1962, when it was opened, and what was going on at the time and contrasting that with now.

"Mac brings very high-quality art right into a venue which has a real community feel, so to have a show which is very much based on people is ideal."

Bringing the show back to the Midlands is

always a positive, says James.

"It's really lovely to have it here, to live at home while also having a show. And to spend time researching our own city. We spend a lot of time researching cities we're touring to, so it's nice to be able to focus attention on home territory. And it will be lovely for some of the schools that we work with nearby to be able to come and experience it."

The show will also have a new ingredient - although visitors may not notice the change.


"Tilda Rice are sponsoring the show, and they've given us a fresh ton of rice, which is exciting as we've been using the same ton of rice for UK versions of the show for a decade now! The old rice is going to be given away to a farmer for animal feed, so we will have fresh new rice - and hopefully we will have that for the next decade."

James is confident Of All The People In All The World will resonate with local audiences.

"At heart we are a theatre company, and the cliché of a theatre company is 'make them laugh, make them cry'. It seems totally implausible that some grains of rice on a sheet of paper can achieve that task, but it does with lots of people. It's a really fun, engaging thing to spend your time with.

"We've toured with comment books, and people have scribbled down thoughts after they've seen the show. The books are full of comments like 'this is amazing, you've made me see the world in a new light, I feel more empathy with the people around me, it's galvanised me into action to try and change the world around me'. That's a real testament, and we're really proud of the show."


